Child on Child abuse (CoCA) and Bullying - what we do about it

Child on Child abuse is not solely bullying, although this does form part of CoCA. CoCA is any form of abuse where there is any kind of physical, sexual, emotional or financial abuse or coercive control between children, both on and offline.

What is bullying?

We try to teach the children that understanding and managing conflict is an important part of growing up. We stress that bullying is not simply a 'falling out' but it is the repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. It can happen face-to-face or online. We know that it is essential that the children feel confident that when they tell us that something is going wrong that we will address it immediately.

As soon as we are informed about an alleged incident of bullying, we will investigate it by speaking to the children who were either involved or may have witnessed the incident or incidents. We will, unless inappropriate, inform the families of the children who are involved so that they can support both their children and the school throughout the whole process.

The children's form tutors will check in with them every week for at least a month to make sure that the bullying behaviour has stopped, their Head of Year will check in with them at the end of the first week and then again at the end of the half term to make sure that there had been no further incidents. We will only close the incident if both parties agree that there have been no further issues.

Sometimes further incidents will occur and it is really important that we are informed so that we can take further, stronger action.

Reading at Iceni

At Iceni Academy, reading is so important to us. Reading opens up new worlds, lets us explore others' ideas, thoughts, experiences and opinions, helps us answer our unanswered questions and also allows us to enjoy stories told by others. We do this in lots of ways: through our English curriculum, through the texts we read and the vocabulary explore across the curriculum and how we approach reading during form time.

In form time, students engage with 'Register and Read', an opportunity to explore real-world, current affairs stories and discuss and debate their contents. Students tackle tricky vocabulary, make predictions about the article based on its title/ image and then read with their class. Topics this half term have included the new Amazon Prime Lord of the Rings series, the story of Holly Willougby and Philip Schofield at Her Majesty the Queen's lying in state and the actions of Just Stop Oil activists in London. This year, we have also been able to purchase a wide range of texts to be read by tutors to their students. This is a development from last year's approach, where all students watched a recorded reading video - we read some great books last year, and the best is still to come! These books form the Iceni Reading Canon - the books we would like all our students to read and enjoy during their time in the academy. You can see a small selection of these, below.

This year we are also proud to launch our Iceni Reading Rewards. You can read more about these in your child's student planner. Students can receive lapel badges and prizes for reaching various reading milestones - beginning with having read five books for a bronze award. In addition, we are excited about two larger reading competitions: 13 before 13, and 16 before 16. There are two lists of books (one for students in Years 7-9, and the second for students in Years 9-11) packed with fantastic reads which we think all students should read before they turn 13 (or 16!). If students read 13 of these (or 16, for the second list!) they can be in with a chance of winning some amazing prizes later in the year.

Our reading programme at Iceni Academy is having a measurable impact on our students' reading ages and engagement with reading, and we are so proud of their effort and hard work with this. To support your child at home, please encourage them to read as often as they can. Not only does reading frequently help your child improve their reading age (and thus better access the curriculum, and statistically perform better in their GCSEs), but also supports wellbeing and reducing stress.

We are lucky to have lots of fantastic local public libraries nearby which are entirely free to access. In addition, Norfolk library services also has an ebook lending scheme, meaning we can all access a wide range of books without having to travel to a library on our own devices at home. All you need is a free library card, and the catalogue will be open to you - for free! You can find out more, here: eBooks, eNewspapers, eMagazines and eAudio - Norfolk County Council. The service allows you to change the font size, translate the text into one of 17 languages and also is enabled with 'read aloud', so you can hear the book aloud as it

English

Humanities

It has been an extremely busy term already for all of us, including Open Evening, where prospective students grappled with the opportunity to build an earthquake proof house made of spaghetti and blu-tac, played a range of Tudor games, took part in a Humanities department quiz and had a spiritual experience traversing a range of faiths. Hopefully, visitors were treated to a sample of what they can expect when entering the Humanities realm and we look forward to welcoming them in September 2023. As we look ahead to the forthcoming assessment window in November, including the crucial first round of mock examinations for Year 11, may I take this opportunity encourage families to continue to support the students in their efforts, particularly revision, which is a critical element in preparing for examinations of every kind. For Year 11, there will be opportunities to attend after school revision sessions in History and Geography after Christmas, which have historically elevated access to the higher grades for those that attend regularly. More information on these to come in the future.

We are also in the process of sending out letters for the History department trip to the World War One Battlefields of Belgium and France, scheduled for 6th-7th July 2023. Similar to last year, we have the option of a second coach, which enables us to open the trip to both Year 10 and Year 11, in addition to Year 9. Anyone who has ever participated in this trip can vouch for what a powerful emotional and learning experience it is, throwing into sharp relief the Year 9 focus on the First World War and contributing to a better understanding of injuries and treatments on the Western Front, critical for Paper One of the GCSE. It is excellent value for money at £200, including a £60 deposit, with the option of paying by instalments, and I can heartily recommend it.

European Bake-Off competition



This half term Oak class from Hockwold primary school joined us for a morning of Science!

We worked on electrical circuits and acid and Alkalis. We ended with a little demonstration of turning water into wine and wine into milk!












We have had a fun and energetic start to our technology journey with all KS3 years beginning with a graphic communication topic. This is designed to build on accuracy while developing their technical drawing and communication skills. Year 7 have been studying the importance of accuracy and measuring, then using these skills to create a technical drawing of navy signal flags that correlate to their names. In Year 8 we extend these skills into more three-dimensional drawing. They learn the difference between Oblique and Isometric. They are then assessed on creating an Isometric robot design inspired by the popular game Minecraft, which builds 3D objects/environments using single cubes. Year 9s focus is on 3D perspective and the difference between one-point and two-point technical drawing, taking inspiration from architectural design. At the end of the unit, they are tasked with designing a high street using their two-point perspective knowledge. Year 10 have also begun a small graphic communication project with the focus on computer aided design and its differences from technical hand drawing. For their task they were given an image of a building which they had to accurately recreate within Sketch Up.

Special Educational Needs News!

Wow! What a start to an academic year this has been. We have had lots of exciting things happening with SEND.

First, we welcomed two new Learning Support Assistants, Mrs White and Mrs Clucas. They both bring a wealth of knowledge and have already put their skills to good use, and have made a great contribution to the team, increasing the capacity to support our students.

We also now have a SEND Hub based within the Humanities blocks. The hub has enabled us to increase the range of support we can put in place. In H2 we have created a therapeutic / mental health support space. H8 is our academic support base where interventions around literacy, numeracy and English as an additional language support is being offered, and then we also have H7 which is our social space for students to use during break times. Within this space we are also developing our sensory space, as well as our 'Just Read' area. This room provides a safe space for students to chat, play games, build things with Lego and spend time together away from the hustle and bustle of the other social spaces within the school.





Alongside this, Mrs Hassey, Mrs Griggs and Mrs Warren have completed Drawing and Talking training, with one more member of staff to be trained in this fantastic therapeutic programme. Plus Mrs Rayner, who is going to be our Thrive Practitioner has begun her yearlong training programme, and will start to work with students on this programme.





We currently have some literacy and numeracy interventions running, however to develop this further we are going to have some of our LSAs trained in Read Write Inc Fresh Start phonics programme and Speech Link – a speech, language and communication programme. These programme will provide a greater range of support we can offer to students so that they are able to fully access their learning across the curriculum.

A PLEA!!! – if anyone has any Lego that they no longer use and would be willing to donate, we gladly take this off your hands for use in H7 at social times and also to further develop Lego Therapy with Mrs Clucas.

Finally, I would like to offer a personal thank you to all of our staff and in particular, the team of LSAs for their hard work and commitment towards supporting our students.
