# Safeguarding

This academic year we have an Iceni Safeguarding Top 5. We will be working across the school to improve support for individuals and families as well as training and workshops for staff. We will continue to share updates throughout the year via newsletters.

- 1. **Derogatory and prejudice related language and related behaviours** we have signed up with the Norfolk LGBT+ programme this year and will be working closely with these around staff training and workshops and support for students.
- 2. Truancy, including internal and external
- 3. Substance Misuse, including vapes we are working with
- 4. **Harmful sexual behaviours (HSB)** we are working closely with JIGSAW around sexual health support within school.

**Mental health, including self-harm and anxiety** - we have just teamed up with Breckland Mental Health Support Team and currently in the planning stages for this to be able to refer individuals for support and to complete staff and student workshops across the year.

At Iceni we will be celebrating **Anti-Bullying Week, 13th - 17<sup>th</sup> November.** On Monday 13<sup>th</sup> November we will be celebrating by staff and students being able to wear 'odd socks' by taking part in Odd Socks Day. Students should be in normal school uniform but can where any kind of socks for the day.

During the first seven weeks at Iceni, they have gained over 5492 positives points and every pupil has received over 5 positives points. This half term has seen KS3 pupils being taught two of football, netball, basketball, rugby, dance, table tennis and fitness, as we focus on the values of teamwork, creativity, resilience and responsibility. With our mirrored curriculum, activities which groups have not yet covered, will be rotated as the year and Key Stages progresses. Year 10 have started with netball, volleyball, football, fitness and table tennis, and will also rotate as the year progresses. Year 11 have selected their preferred pathways, seeing our traditional, social and alternative sport options selected. Year 10 Sports Science pupils have started their first part of R181 whilst Year 11 draw to a close on this major unit of work.

A whole host of fixtures have been taking place, but the stand out has been the formation and our first entry, to the South Norfolk Girl's football league, where we have played fixtures with both a Senior (U16) and Junior (U14) team. These league fixtures will carry on until Easter, taking a break when we lose the light next half term.

There will be a new club timetable circulated shortly, reflecting the changing weather and light available.

#### **Fixture News**

As mentioned we have seen football league fixtures for both Senior and Junior Girls football. This is the same league system for the boys, with Senior, Junior and Year 7 team playing fixtures so far. We have also had a number of Senior and Junior Netball league games. Our Thursday afternoon fixtures have also been focused on boy's football and girl's netball, with Year 9, 8 and 7 afternoons taking place. It was superb to see nearly 60 Year 7 pupils sign up and participate in their afternoon. Thank you to my team for all the hours they have volunteered to these fixtures and clubs.
