Did you know? Free School Meals

Did you know that if you receive one of the following benefits, you can apply for Free School Meals?

- Universal Credit with an annual earned income of no more than £7,400 after tax
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual gross income of no more than £16,19

This gives your child access to a free meal every day at school, but also gives the academy access to funding called the Pupil Premium. This government funding can help with extra tuition, teaching and after school

activities. This year, for example, the Pupil Premium is being used to fund:

- Small group literacy and numeracy interventions
- Revision guides
- Reading for pleasure strategies and resources
- Access to online learning platforms
- 1:1 and small group tuition, part funded through the National Tutoring Programme
- Reduced costs for educational trips and visits, including residential trips
- Access to a free breakfast club (coming soon!)

Attendance Update

We need your help, please. We know that sometimes our pupils cannot come to school because they are really unwell - and that's the right thing to do for them and other students. Medical advice is clear however that children with mild illness will often be well enough to attend - for example if they have a cough, or cold, without a temperature. The NHS guidance - <u>Is my child too</u> <u>ill for school? - NHS (www.nhs.uk)</u> is designed to support parents in their decision making about mild illness.

We also know that pupils fall behind their friends and classmates when they miss school. Here at Iceni Academy we want the amount of missed education to be reduced as much as possible. We believe that our community is stronger together, with all of our pupils in school, on time, every day. We are building life skills, life-long friendships and preparing your child for future success.

We also know that you can have a significant effect on your child's absences this academic year and we would really appreciate your help and support ensuring that they come to school every day so that they can get the best possible outcomes. We want to work with you to achieve this – please do not hesitate to contact the school if there is anything we can do to support you or your child. We appreciate that every family's situation is unique.

From September there are some changes around attendance legislation laws—Parent fines for unauthorised absences will be brought under a national framework. A fine to parents <u>must</u> be considered if a child misses 5 days of school for unauthorised absence. Alongside this, costs for fines will go up from £60 to £80 if paid within 21 days and from £120 to £160 if paid in 28 days. (from gov.uk)
